SPY OPS - FLYING THE U-2

Lieutenant Colonel Rich Perkins

About our Guest Speaker for January 5, 2002

Lieutenant Colonel Rich Perkins attended Mississippi State University on a full AFROTC scholarship. He obtained his private pilot's license through the ROTC sponsored flight program and graduated in 1973 with a BS in Aerospace Engineering. He later earned a double Masters degree in Business Administration and Management.

He completed pilot training at Moody AFB, GA and was assigned to Little Rock AFB, AR flying the C -130 Hercules. After three years of tactical airlift worldwide and too much time away from home, he retired from C-130s as one of the youngest C-130 aircraft commanders ever and accepted an assignment back to his hometown of Columbus, MS flying T-38s for Air Training Command as an instructor pilot. In addition to having a great time flying a supersonic sport plane, he was the Chief of T-38 Academic Training there. graduating over 1000 student pilots. Three years later, on a

by-name request, he moved on to a T-38 flying staff tour at Air Training Command headquarters, Randolph AFB, TX, where he taught pilots to be instructors and literally wrote the book on Applied Aerodynamics for undergraduate pilot training. He also engineered ATC's transition to computer-assisted instruction and helped lay the groundwork for ATC's next generation trainer. In 1984, then Major Perkins volunteered and was selected for the U-2/TR-1 program. He "pipelined" direct from Beale AFB, CA to RAF Alconbury, UK and spent several years fighting crosswinds, low ceilings and bad visibility, working his way up to flight commander

and check pilot, and enjoying Europe. His next assignment was to the underground of Strategic Air Command in Omaha, NE, where ("as one of three guys out of 5000 who could spell U-2') he ran U-2/TR-1 operations worldwide from the Strategic Reconnaissance Center. From Chief of U-2 Special Operations he moved to NASA Ames Research Center where he's presently the Chief Air Force Liaison to NASA on the

west coast.



Due to retire from the Air Force next year, Col Perkins has already set up his next life. He and his partner started a full service FBO and flight school at Livermore Airport, Livermore, CA: Attitude Aviation. "Attitude Aviation is mainly for fun flying." he notes. "We teach everything from private pilot through CFI, but we specialize in aerobatics, emergency maneuver training and tailwheel transitions. Our fleet is unique. We have everything from a pristine 1941 Piper Cub to an Extra 200. We have Pitts two Specials.

Citabrias, aerobatic Grobs, you name it. And, yes, we do have Cessnas. We have our own maintenance facility and over 43,000 square feet of hangar space. It's a fun place."

Col Perkins has also launched an airshow career with our own Ted Carr, who owns the L-39 jet known on the airshow circuit as the Firecat. Col Perkins flew several shows last season, including the largest show in Canada, and is setting up the show schedule for 2002. Ted and Col Perkins offer jet transition and LOA training in the Firecat as well.

Somebody pinch me! Until my wife, Sylvia, and I discovered PML last year, I was glued to my desk twelve hours a day. Now I have to remember to call the office. It's PML fever and there's no vaccine. They stay with him until he is either able to fly or dies. Then they launch out to join another formation or to catch up with the flock. PMLAA members have demonstrated this same compassion, rallying to support friends in need, time and time again.



PROP WASH



THE SEASONS


