# From The Airports Manager by Jim Thomas

#### Airport Safety Policies

The Pine Mountain Lake Airport is a friendly place and we encourage safe use of the airport by everyone. It is important to remember that the airport was constructed to facilitate aircraft operations and meet FAA design requirements. Use of the airport for access and exercise is allowed but only if the airport's Safety Policies are followed. I want to emphasize that at the airport, aircraft always have the right-of-way over all others. Everyone must also understand that safety is the most important goal at the airport. There are a few policies that have been implemented to assure safety is always maintained at the airport. These Safety Policies are:

- Aircraft ALWAYS have the right-of-way over all other vehicles and pedestrians.
- 2. Understand that a spinning propeller can kill a person or animal instantly.
- NEVER walk or drive on the runway except to cross it. It is a very dangerous place. Aircraft can be quiet and not easily heard when they are gliding in for landing.
- 4. The Obstacle Free Area (OFA) (think of it as the danger zone) is that area within 125' of either side of the runway centerline. The edge of the OFA is also the same distance from the runway centerline as the runway hold lines (the double solid double dashed line on the runway entrance/exit). Under no circumstances should anyone be in the OFA except to cross the runway.
- 5. If you find an aircraft coming at you on the taxiway move at least 25' off the taxiway to the side away from the runway and stop until the aircraft passes.
- 6. If you find an aircraft coming at you on the ramp move to a tie-down or protected area and wait for the aircraft to pass.
- 7. All cars and trucks must only cross the runway at the far west end. No car or truck crossing is permitted at the mid field crossing.
- 8. Pedestrians, bicycles, open vehicles (golf carts, motorcycles, etc.) are permitted to cross mid field but only after <u>STOPPING</u> behind the hold line and looking twice both directions, the first time for aircraft on the ground and the second time for aircraft in the air.
- 9. Don't drive off the asphalt pavement especially on a turn. Driving with your wheels in the gravel

kicks gravel onto the pavement which can become a hazard to a turning propeller. Propellers can pick up a small rock from the pavement which can then nick the propeller blade and also be propelled like a bullet in any direction.

- 10. When crossing the runway, regardless of whether you are on foot or in a vehicle, you should cross quickly. Don't lollygag across the runway. Pick up your pace if walking or quickly accelerate after stopping to look for aircraft.
- 11. All pets must be on a leash per County ordinance, and please pick up after your pets.

I want to emphasize that a single incident between an aircraft and a pedestrian or vehicle could impact everyone's privilege to use the airport. That includes the use of the airport by residents. It is indeed a situation where one person can ruin it for everyone. The airport has an exceptional safety record and we all want to keep it that way. You can do your part by sharing these policies with others using the airport.

There is a hand-out that is available in the plastic box on the outside of the pilot's lounge that provides additional information on the use of the airport.

Please feel free to take one. ◆
