## FROM THE AIRPORTS DIRECTOR – JIM THOMAS RE-ROOFING THE PILOT'S LOUNGE

I have received many inquiries on when the roof on the pilot's lounge would be replaced. Anyone who has looked at the composite roof shingles on the south side can tell that the sun and weather have taken their toll over the years. It is a wonder the roof has not yet leaked during our winter weather.

The replacement of the roof was put on hold two years ago when the Pine Mountain Lake Airport Master Plan was approved. The Master Plan calls for the existing pilot's lounge to be removed and replaced by a commercial hangar that includes a pilot's lounge with public restrooms. Anticipating that a new commercial hangar would be constructed within a couple of years, I decided not to put the effort into a new pilot's lounge roof.

As we all know things often don't work out the way we plan. Although a request for proposals (RFP) was issued that included the construction of the new commercial hangar, there were no proposals received for it. So, it appears that the existing pilot's lounge will remain in place for the foreseeable future and now the replacement of the roof has become a priority.

Installing a new roof is something that the members of the PMLAA could perform as a community service project. The Airports Department can provide the new roofing materials and the disposal of the old roofing and the Aviation Association could provide the labor. I believe this work could be accomplished in two working days; one to remove the old roof and make any needed repairs, and another day to lay down the new roof. Of course this work should be performed after the daytime temperatures have moderated a bit. I'll be working with the Association to plan out a couple of days in October when this work could be done.

If you are interested in helping with this project, please contact Norm or me. We will put your name on our volunteer list and let you know when the work days are scheduled.

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### **TOM SWEENEY BIO**

Tom Sweeney has been involved with the Aerospace Industry for over 34 years. He started with Rockwell International in 1974 on the B1-A program. In 1978 thanks to a change in national priorities (program cancellation), he joined Martin Marietta, now Lockheed Martin, in Denver, CO. Since then he has worked on multiple programs including the Space Shuttle, Titan, classified space programs and most recently the TIROS satellite. These assignments involved three moves to Denver, two to Vandenberg, a two-year stint in Long Beach and finally to Sunnyvale in 2001. As the Deputy Program Director, Tom manages the day-to-day operations and processing of the final TIROS spacecraft designated NOAA N Prime. N Prime is the last of a series that started in April 1960 and is scheduled to launch from Vandenberg AFB next February.

Growing up on and around Air Force bases Tom has always had an interest in aviation. Thanks to the mentoring and encouragement from our own Joel Avey, Tom is learning to fly taildraggers at Amelia Reid Aviation in San Jose. He is also a student of Tae Kwon Do and golf. Living in Pine Mountain Lake enables him to indulge his lifelong passion of hiking the Sierra. Tom has also been a regular volunteer at Camp Tuolumne Trails.

#### **TIROS** (Television Infrared Observation Satellite)

The first TIROS satellite was launched from Cape Canaveral on April 1<sup>st</sup>, 1960. It sent back over 22,000 images in its 77 day life in orbit.



Since then there have been 44 spacecraft built in the TIROS series. The last one, NOAA N-Prime is scheduled to launch February 4<sup>th</sup>, 2009.

In addition to the familiar images of cloud cover we see on the evening news, the present day satellites provide data on snow and ice cover,



fires, obscuration such as volcanic ash and smoke, moisture content in the atmosphere, vegetation, sea surface temperature and ozone depletion. Specialized instruments receive data from buoys at sea and wildlife implanted with special transmitters. Particularly noteworthy is the presence of the SARSAT (Search and Rescue Satellite) package which receives distress beacons from ships at sea, downed aircraft and personal locator beacons (PLB) carried by hikers, hunters and snowmachine operators in the Arctic. SARSAT has been credited with saving over 24,000 lives worldwide since 1982.



Many aviation weather forecasts benefit from data collected by POES satellites. Microwave sounders on board are used to measure temperature and moisture content at various altitudes to determine lapse and rain rate data.

In our October meeting we will look at the history, instruments, products and processing of the TIROS spacecraft. For those who take to the skies, seas and hills, we will look at SARSAT and some of its accomplishments.
